A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR

Dear Friends in Christ,

Bible study...Sunday School...are they really that important? I would say they are, especially in today's society and the attitude toward the concept of truth that is prevalent. Too often, we hear the phrase (or something like it), "That might be true for you, but it isn't for me." That is a dangerous proposition, especially in matters spiritual.

King David prayed, "Teach me your way, O LORD, and I will walk in your truth; give me an undivided heart, that I may fear your name" (Psalm 86:11, NIV). If we are to know the truth, especially in matters of the spirit, we have to begin with the Word of God. That is the foundation of all that we know. In fact, all education—whether on Scripture or science or math or business, etc.—needs to begin in the frame of mind of God as Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier.

Martin Luther once wrote, "True it is that human wisdom and the liberal arts are noble gifts of God, good and useful for all kinds of things, wherefore one cannot do without them in this life. But they can never thoroughly tell us what sin and righteousness are in the eyes of God, how we can get rid of sins, become pious and just before God, and pass from death to into life. Wisdom divine and an art supreme are required for this; and one does not find them in the books of any jurist or worldly-wise person, but in the Bible alone, which is the Holy Spirit's Book."¹

Yes, Bible study and Sunday School really are that important. They allow us to remain true in our understanding of the world around us and ourselves within us. We all need a strong foundation to stand upon in this world, and that foundation is only strengthened when we are regularly in the Word of God.

September 28	My Faith and Society

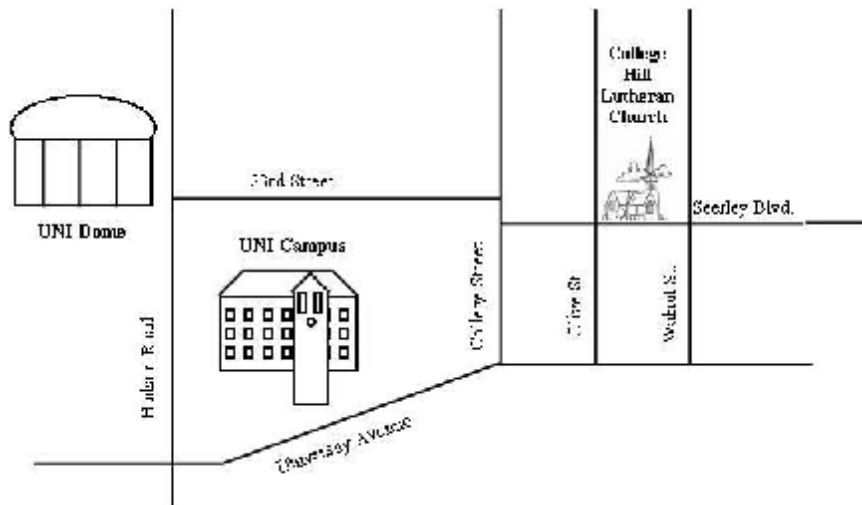
The LSF Bible Study begins at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday nights in the Brammer Lounge (lower level) of the Brammer Student Center.

FROM THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY

Here are some tips to ensure your donations to the church are properly recorded.

- (1) Use your assigned envelope. (You do not need to be a member to get a box of envelopes -- if you want the church to provide a record of your giving, please ask me for a box.)
- (2) Mark on your envelope the amount of your donation. This makes the counting job easier. Entering your name is not necessary, but serves as a double check when we enter the data.
- (3) If desired, you may designate how you want your donation to be used.

Mark your envelope to make your intent clear. For example:

- (a) Donations to assist people in need should be made to the HELP fund. Mark your envelope "HELP"
- (b) Donations to groups for which the church already provides a budget, i.e. Sunday School, high school youth (LYF), and Campus ministry (LSF), will count toward the budgeted amount. If you wish to ensure that LYF or LSF receives more than their budgeted amount, your donation should be given directly to that group. This typically happens during fund raisers and the donation is NOT given via regular envelope offerings.
- (c) Thrivent has a matching program for our campus ministry. To donate here, you must complete Thrivent paperwork (see Virgil Mauer). Donations are given to the church and are marked Thrivent Giving-Plus.

If you have questions or find an error on your giving statements, please bring it to my attention as soon as possible. My phone number is on the statement or you may talk to me in person.

LLL Convention News

Thirteen Lutheran Laymen supporters from Iowa East District attended the 88th Annual Convention of the International Lutheran Laymen's League held in Topeka, KS July 28th through July 30, 2005. More than 1100 LLLers from across the United States, Canada and other foreign countries were in attendance.

The theme for the 88th convention and FY 2006 is "Enlarge the Harvest" 2 Cor 9:10. Some of the outstanding speakers were LCMS President Dr. Gerald Kieschnich, LWML President Linda Reiser, LCMS Kansas District President Rev. Keith Kohlmeier. In addition the Rev. Ken Klaus, speaker of the Lutheran Hour, preached two powerful sermons.

International LLL President Jack Kidwell stressed two major themes: leadership development and laity activation. John Tews was re-elected Governor of Region 7.

Tim Goeglein, special assistant to the President of the United States and deputy director of the White House Office of Public Liaison, spoke before nearly 900 people during a fellowship luncheon at the Int'l LLL Convention in Topeka, Kansas, about sharing his faith in his work. Goeglein brought greetings from President George W. Bush and Laura Bush and says that President Bush and he regularly share their faith with each other. "The President asked me where I was going to speak this week and I told him, I am going to God's country to speak to God's people. And the President said to be sure to pass on his greetings and to tell you how much he appreciates your prayers."

When asked what is America's greatest challenge, Goeglein quickly replied, "Global terrorism. We are facing the most momentous period in history. Every day on my way to the White House, I pass the Pentagon wall that was destroyed by the terrorists on my left and the rows of patriots at Arlington Cemetery on my right ... 9/11 greets me every day. It's been said that we are the last great hope of this world and that's because we serve a remarkable God."

"The greatest joy in my life is to know God and to love Him forever," he said. "It's not just about being a Christian certain days of the week. God wants our commitment 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. That's easy to say when I am standing here before Christians, but would I say it before a crowd of ACLU members? Yes, I would and that's not because of me, but because of the Holy Spirit within me."

Mr. Goeglein is an example of the quality of speakers at the convention.

Saturday closing of the convention featured a tribute to the 75th anniversary of the Lutheran Hour Radio program. The first program aired October 23, 1930. Throughout the night Rev. Klaus was joined on stage by Dr. Oswald Hoffmann, Dr. Walter A. Maier II and Dr. Ralph Mayan in paying tribute to the world's longest-running Christian outreach radio program. The program also recognized the work of the program's other speakers, Rev. Lawrence Acker, Rev. Armin Oldsen, and Rev. Wallace Schulz.

We all were blessed by the spiritual uplift given us by attending the convention.

Synopsis of the August Board of Directors' Meeting

Tuesday, August 9, 2005 at 7:00 p.m.

Treasurer's Report was given by Marcia Stirler and was approved pending audit. After discussion regarding money given to specified groups like the LYF, a motion was made and approved for the financial secretary to put a paragraph in the September NL informing congregational members the best way to give money to these groups so it is accounted for properly. A motion was also made and approved to leave the money currently received and designated for LYF in the special account until later decisions are made.

Pastor's Report: Motion was made and approved to accept transfer of Tim and Denise Tjarks membership from Our Redeemer, Cedar Falls.

Recent Activity: CHLC Parish Planning Calendars are complete and can be picked up. Letters of introduction were sent to 51 incoming college students and their parents. Students and parents were also sent devotionals designed to prepare them for the transition to college. Rev. Jerry Markel has been installed as pastor of Concordia Lutheran Church in Waterloo. He had been serving as long term vacancy pastor when they extended the call to be the pastor of the parish.

Upcoming Activity: There will be two baptisms on Sunday, August 28: Frannie Ogilvie, daughter of Pastor and Becky; and Hazel Yan, an international student who has been receiving instruction from Pastor.

Confirmation instruction will begin on Wednesday, September 7. Pastor will be taking Sunday, September 4 as vacation. Rev. William Riley from Cedar Rapids will be filling in for him to lead worship.

Evangelism: Welcome folders were distributed to twelve families whose children attended VBS. JoAn Stevenson also reported that she is working on an ad with Pastor to be placed in the PRIDE upcoming Courier special September publication used to showcase the community. This is a multi-media product and will be online via the Courier for 365 days.

Education: VBS was held Aug. 1-5 and the Board of Education thanks Darci Russell for so capably directing it. Thirty and thirty-five students between age 3 and sixth grade attended. A fine representation of high school youth workers and adults helped in various areas. Thanks to all who volunteered, furnished treats, or donated craft supplies and other fun items for the safari to the "Kingdom of the Son". It was an awesome experience for us all.

Now we are planning for the new Sunday School and Bible Class instruction year beginning September 11, 2005 with a special Rally Day celebration. The quest for instructors has begun with requests for volunteers. All the students who attended VBS will be invited to SS at CHLC.

LYF Youth Group: Seven youth helped at VBS in August. On the last day the youth were invited to McBurneys afterwards to paint a machine shed for pay. Three youth attended and had an enjoyable time.

Plans are underway for a fall kick-off camp out at McBurneys Friday, August 26, at which time we'll discuss officer positions and decide regular meeting times, service opportunities, worship service involvement, a mission trip for next summer, and fundraising.

The youth committee plans to start meeting regularly with Pastor.

There are several District wide events coming up. Oct. 2-3 a Youth Bowling Tournament; Oct. 7-8 is a 5th/6th grade district retreat; January 13-15 a Youth ministry Conference in Houston, TX, and the next National Youth Gathering is July 28-Aug. 1, 2007 in New Orleans. Registration starts fall, 2006.

Lay Ministry: One hospital visit was made for the month of July. Anyone wishing to have a lay person visit a CHLC member or friend for any reason, please forward information to Pastor, Board of Lay Ministry Director, or the church secretary, with correct address and time to meet.

The Board of Lay Ministry will assist Pastor during the time off he has requested in August. Students are being asked to help when Sylvia takes her vacation in the near future. Bob Stevenson submitted his resignation to the Board as Director of Lay Ministry. A motion was approved to accept Bob's resignation. We thank Bob for his past service on the Board of Directors.

Campus Ministry: Tim Gamble thanks the peer ministers for their hard work this summer. Classes start Aug. 22. Welcome week activities include: Aug. 20 -- Union BBQ and hypnotist; Aug. 21 – Potluck; Aug. 24 – LSF Fun Night with a grill out; Aug. 27 – CHLC picnic; and Aug. 28 – Cookout and mini-golf.

Church Properties: Keith Macomber reported that a new bulletin board and white board has been ordered for the student lounge. Parts have been ordered to change the price of the washer and dryer to \$.50. The Laser Printer has been replaced after the old one failed. Cost as \$98.38 after rebate. The copy machine was repaired with an estimated cost of \$250. Facility Rental Agreement and Future Projects priorities are on hold.

OLD BUSINESS:

Amendments to Constitution and By- Laws: Roger Russell presented the constitutional amendments proposed. There are three and they involve 1) the name change of the Brammer Student Center, previously Brammer Memorial Center; 2) Article II A of the By-Laws will state Voters' Assembly meetings will be held during the specified months of January, April, July and October, instead of on the second Tuesday of the month; and 3) Article VII M of the By-Laws has it's language cleaned up to make it consistent with Article VII A of the By-Laws regarding the Executive Directors position regarding calling and presiding over meetings.

Keith shared several other constitutional items that were discussed but not amended. They are: 1) the constitutional article that states if a voting member misses 4 meetings without good reason he/she will be dropped from the voting roster. Keith suggested that this needs to be addressed at a voter's meeting. 2) It was decided that the high school youth group should remain under the Board of Education. Several other areas discussed involved realizing that if we have 2 members-at-large our total number of board members would exceed 10 which would be unconstitutional. According to the Constitution, the Director of Lay Ministry should have knowledge of worship and music.

A motion was approved to accept the recommendations of the Constitution Revision Committee as presented to the Board, and submit the three revisions to the congregation at a special Voters Meeting. The Board of Directors agreed to Tuesday, September 6 for a congregational meeting. A letter will be sent out to all members.

Appointment of Board members to fill vacancy: This was tabled to a special Board of Directors meeting to be held Sunday, August 14 after fellowship, allowing time to talk to Kevin DeVries and Tim Tjarks regarding which positions they would be willing to serve.

Election of Executive Director: A motion was unanimously passed to elect Keith Macomber as executive director.

NEW BUSINESS:

Youth Group and Guidelines: Rich and Becky McBurney presented the Board members with a copy of the district LYF guidelines and a revised set of guidelines for use with CHLC Youth Group. A motion was approved to use these guidelines as a starting point and that Rich and Becky McBurney and Darci Russell act as the committee to continue the Youth Program. The guidelines will be reviewed by Board Directors and recommendations made at the next meeting.

Thrivent Youth Leadership Initiative Grant: Application for this grant was approved.

Black Hawk County Thrivent Meeting: Motion was approved to have this meeting held at CHLC again if they want, with the youth helping serve.

October Voters' Assembly: Motion approved to change October 9 meeting to October 16 at 6:00 p.m.

Web Site Change: After discussion regarding the CHLC web site and domain costs, the Board came to the general consensus for Pastor to look at other web sites and report back to the Board.

CHLC Neighborhood Association: The board approved a motion to renew membership in this organization at our current \$10 level.

Next Board meeting will be held September 13, 2005 at 7:00 p.m.
